# Cutting

All measurements include  $\frac{1}{4}$ " seam allowances.

Cut out your fabric as listed in the tables below. Refer to the cutting diagrams for the white and gray background fabrics to help you make efficient cuts from your fabric.

## Crib

A (white) (120)  $2\frac{1}{2}$ " x  $4\frac{1}{2}$ "  
(60)  $2\frac{1}{2}$ " squares

B (gray) (15)  $8\frac{1}{2}$ " squares  
(60)  $2\frac{1}{2}$ " squares

C (blue) (60)  $2\frac{1}{2}$ " squares

## Throw

A (white) (192)  $3$ " x  $5\frac{1}{2}$ "  
(100)  $3$ " squares

B (gray) (25)  $10\frac{1}{2}$ " squares  
(96)  $3$ " squares

C (blue) (96)  $3$ " squares

## Twin

A (white) (248)  $3$ " x  $5\frac{1}{2}$ "  
(128)  $3$ " squares

B (gray) (32)  $10\frac{1}{2}$ " squares  
(124)  $3$ " squares

C (blue) (124)  $3$ " squares

## Queen

A (white) (320)  $3$ " x  $5\frac{1}{2}$ "  
(164)  $3$ " squares

B (gray) (41)  $10\frac{1}{2}$ " squares  
(160)  $3$ " squares

C (blue) (160)  $3$ " squares

# Sewing your blocks

All seam allowances are  $\frac{1}{4}$ ".

This quilt has two blocks: snowball and pinwheel blocks.

## Sew your snowball blocks

The snowball blocks are  $8\frac{1}{2}$ " unfinished for the Crib, and  $10\frac{1}{2}$ " unfinished for the Throw, Twin, and Queen sizes. You need:

- 15 snowball blocks for the Crib,
- 25 for the Throw,
- 32 for the Twin, and
- 41 for the Queen.

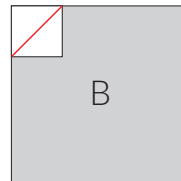
For these blocks you use the large gray (B) squares and the small white (A) squares.

Sew your snowball blocks:

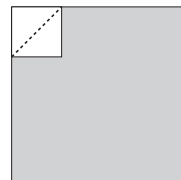
- 1 Mark a diagonal line on the back of each white (A) square with a water-soluble marker.



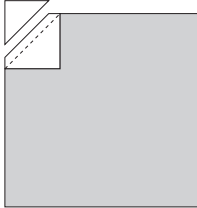
- 2 Place this square in the corner of a large gray (B) square, noting the orientation of the diagonal line in the illustration below.



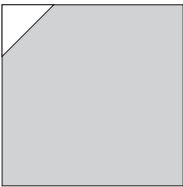
- 3 Sew across the pair on the diagonal line.



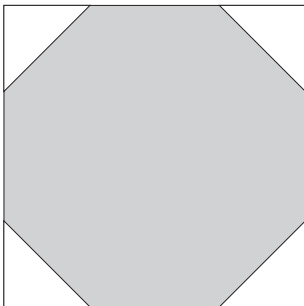
- 4** Trim the extra triangle off of the corner, about  $\frac{1}{4}$ " from the seam you just sewed. (These "bonus triangles" are not used in the quilt. You can use them in your backing or in another project—make small half-square triangles by sewing the pair together  $\frac{1}{4}$ " away from the diagonal edge.)



- 5** Press the corner out. You can press the seam either toward the darker fabric or open.



- 6** Repeat this process for the other three corners to complete your snowball block.



## Sew your pinwheel blocks

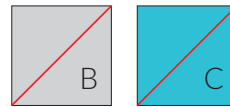
The pinwheel blocks are also  $8\frac{1}{2}$ " unfinished for the Crib, and  $10\frac{1}{2}$ " unfinished for the Throw, Twin, and Queen sizes. You need:

- 15 pinwheel blocks for the Crib,
- 24 for the Throw,
- 31 for the Twin, and
- 40 for the Queen.

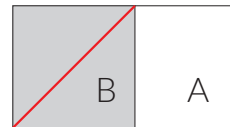
For these blocks you use the small gray (B) squares, the small blue/green (C) squares, and the white (A) rectangles.

Sew your pinwheel blocks:

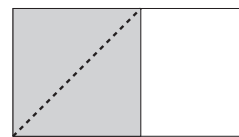
- 1** Mark a diagonal line on the back of each small gray (B) and blue/green (C) square with a water soluble marker.



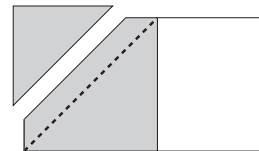
- 2** Place a gray square on top of a white (A) rectangle (right sides facing), noting the orientation of the diagonal in the illustration below.



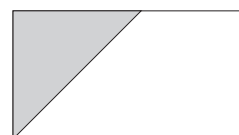
- 3** Sew across this pair on the diagonal line.



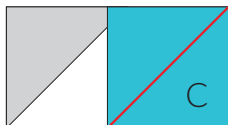
- 4** Trim the extra triangle off of the corner, about  $\frac{1}{4}$ " from the seam you just sewed.



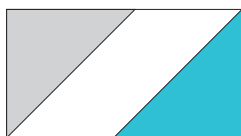
- 5** Press the corner out. You can press the seam either toward the darker fabric or open.



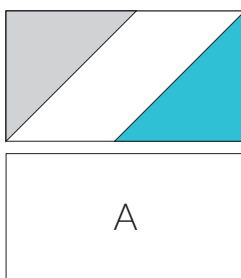
- 6** Place a blue/green (C) square on the opposite end of the white rectangle (right sides facing), noting carefully the orientation of the diagonals in the illustration below.



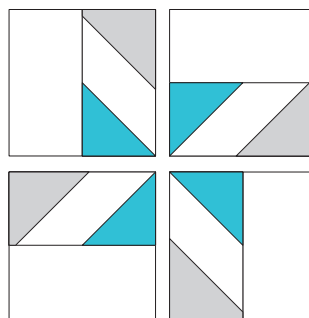
- 7** Sew across this pair on the diagonal line and trim the extra triangle off of the corner, about  $\frac{1}{4}$ " from the seam you just sewed. Press the corner out. Again, you can press the seam either toward the darker fabric or open. However, it is easier when sewing the pinwheels together if you press the seam towards the blue/green square.



- 8** Sew one white rectangle to the component from step 9, noting carefully the orientation of the component in relation to the white rectangle. The wide edge of the blue/green triangle should be touching this new white rectangle.



- 9** Sew together four of these components as illustrated below to finish one pinwheel block.



## Assembling your quilt top

Sew the rest of your quilt top together following the assembly diagram.

## Quilting & finishing

When you are done the quilt top, press it well from both sides.

Layer your well-pressed quilt top with your batting and backing and baste your quilt.

Quilt, square it off so the edges are nice and straight, and then sew on your binding. Wash and enjoy!

# Assembly

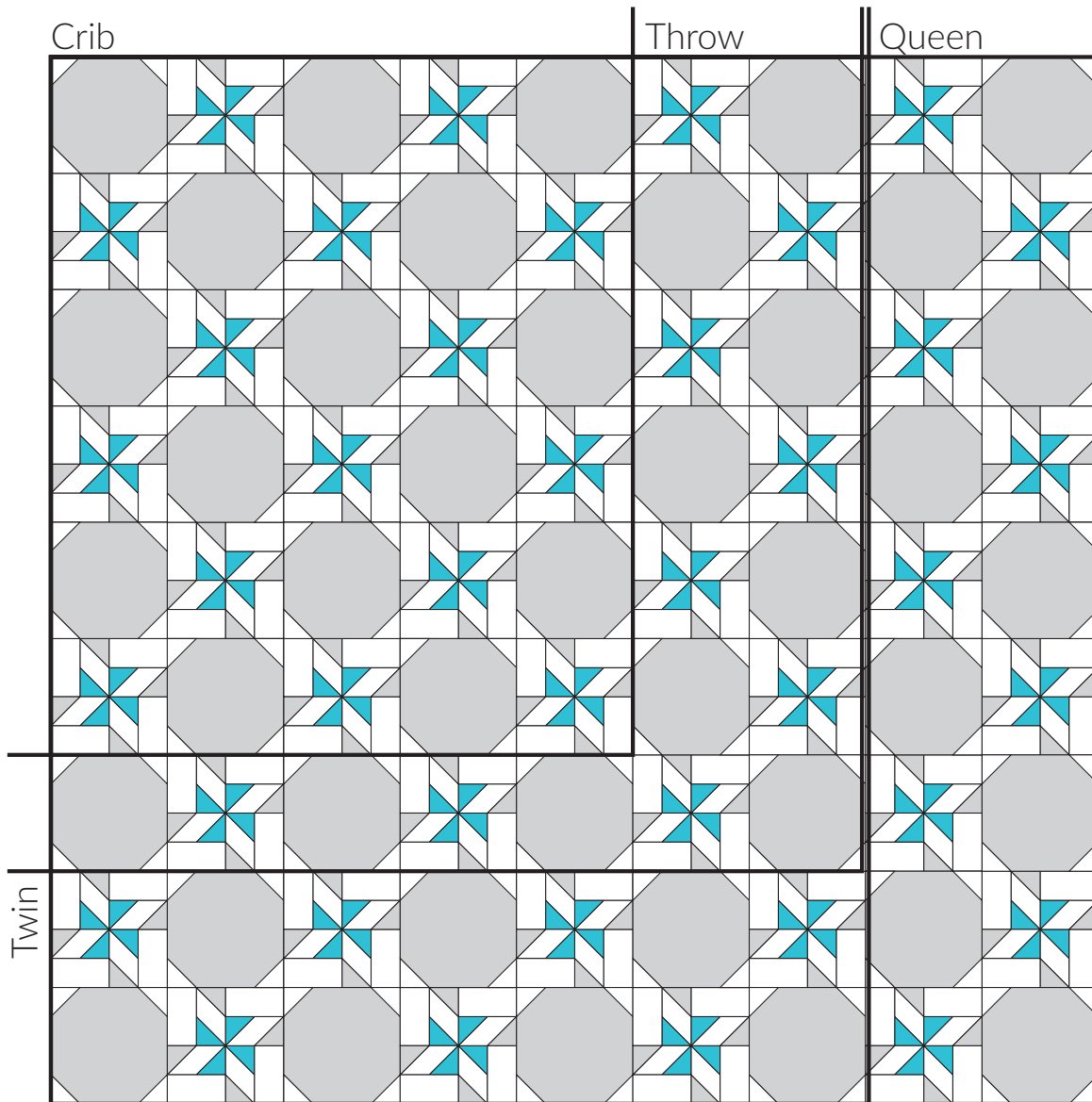
Sew your blocks together into rows, and then sew the rows together as shown below. Press towards the snowball blocks or open.

Crib: 6 rows x 5 columns

Throw: 7 rows x 7 columns

Twin: 9 rows x 7 columns

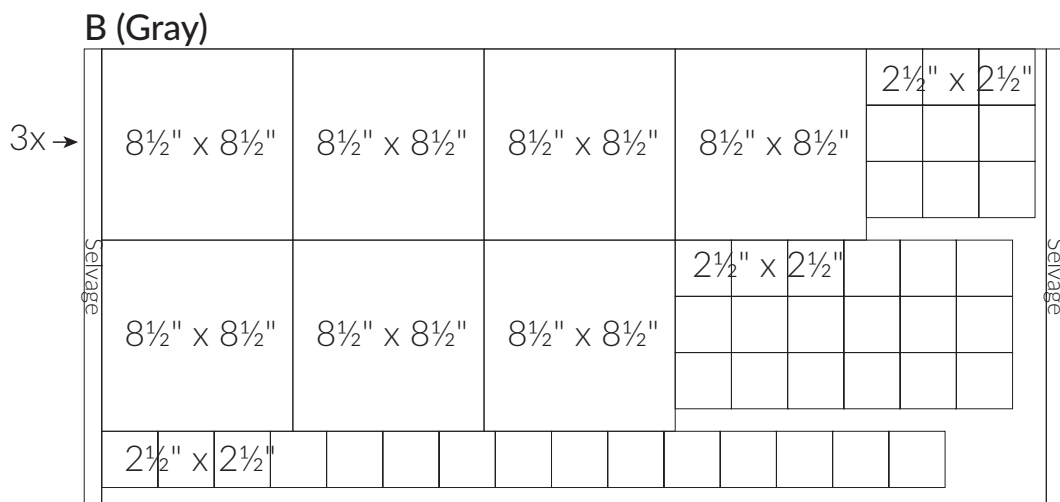
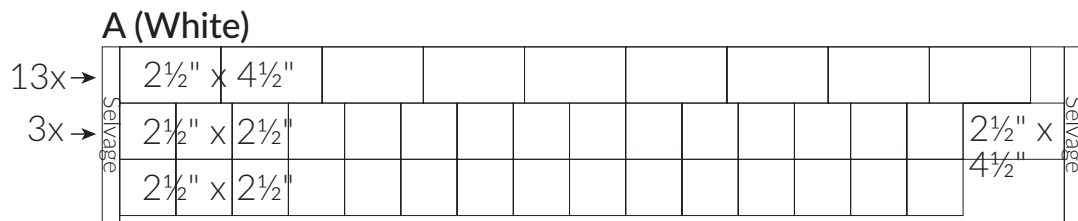
Queen: 9 rows x 9 columns



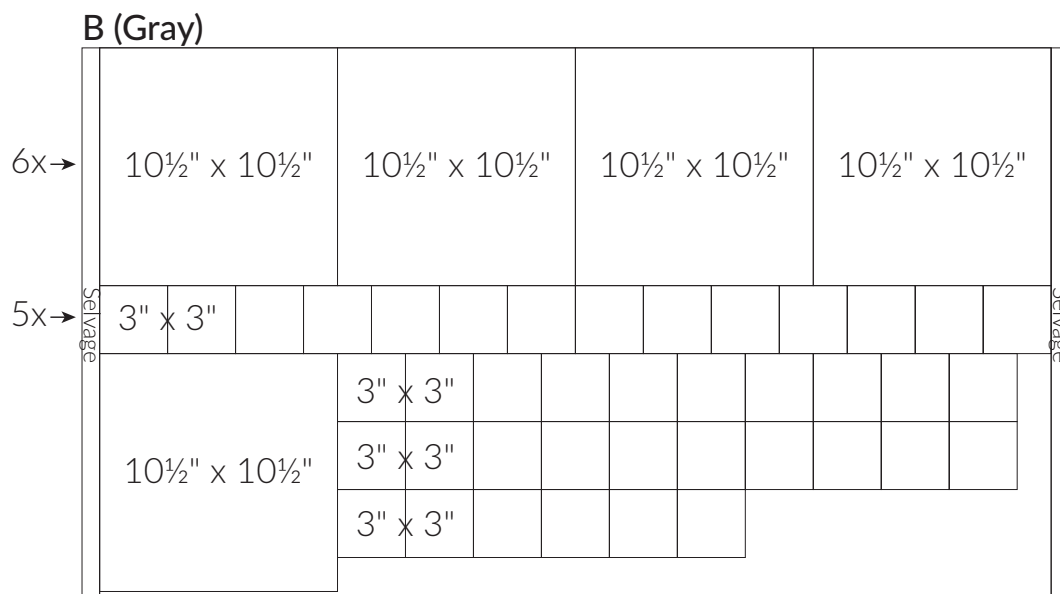
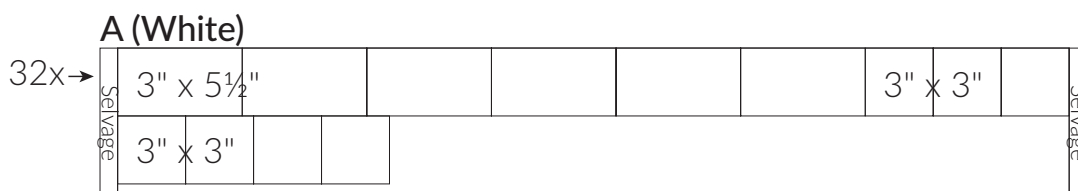
# Cutting diagrams: Crib and Throw

Use the following diagrams to cut your fabric. Some rows need to be cut multiple times. For example: 3x→ means to cut three of that row.

## Crib



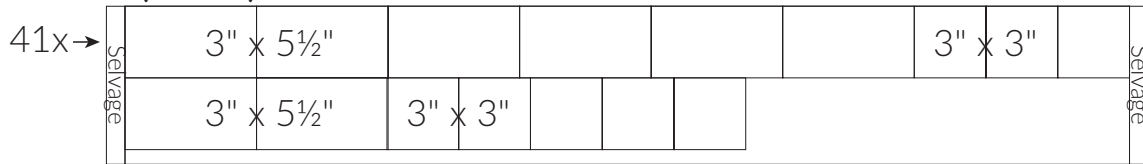

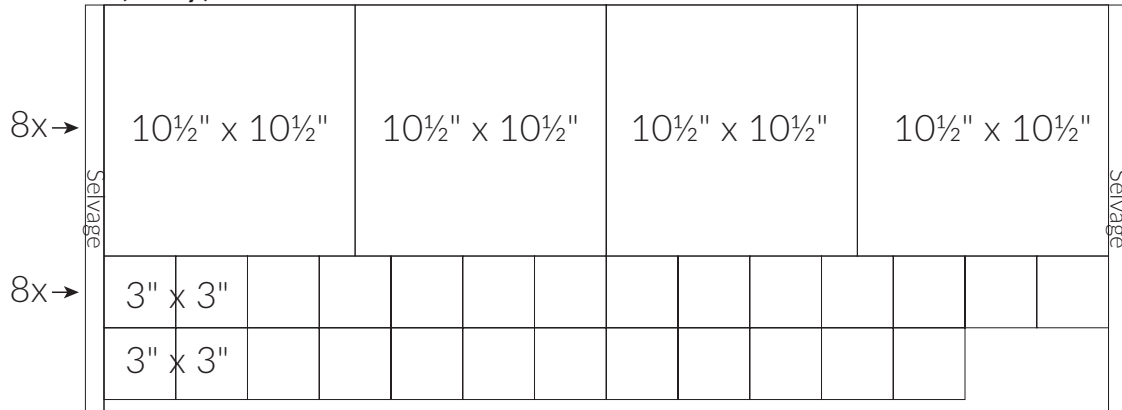

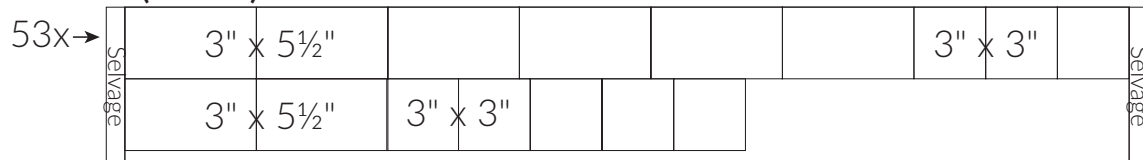

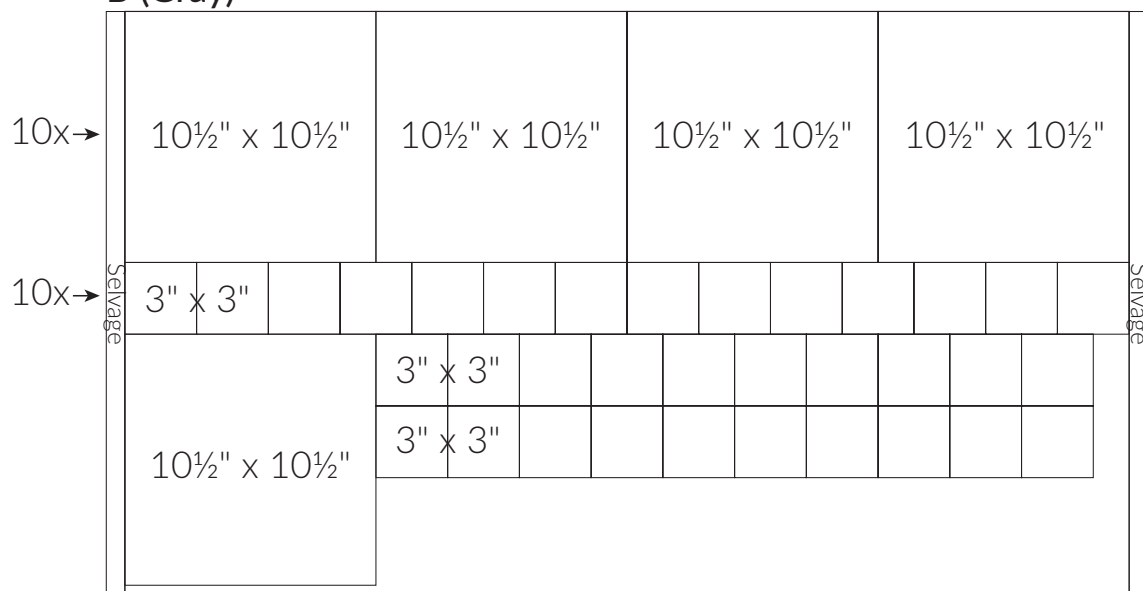

## Fabric

You will need a variety of 100% cotton quilting fabrics, 42" wide, as listed in the table below. I recommend purchasing slightly more than listed just in case.

Choose a solid or a non-busy print for your background that contrasts well with your pinwheel fabrics.

The fabrics used in the cover quilt are all Kona cottons. The white is PFD, the light gray is Silver, and the blues/greens are: Pond, Pool, Aloe, Candy green, Bahama blue, Azure, Capri, Bluegrass, Kale, Jade green, Cypress, and Breakers.

Binding**	½ yard	⅔ yard	⅔ yard	¾ yard

\*If you would like a larger queen, you can add a border using either the white or light gray fabric. If you do enlarge the quilt, you will need extra batting, binding, and backing fabric.

\*\*Binding amount assumes 2½" strips, cut the width of the fabric. You will need additional fabric if you choose to cut your fabric on the bias.
